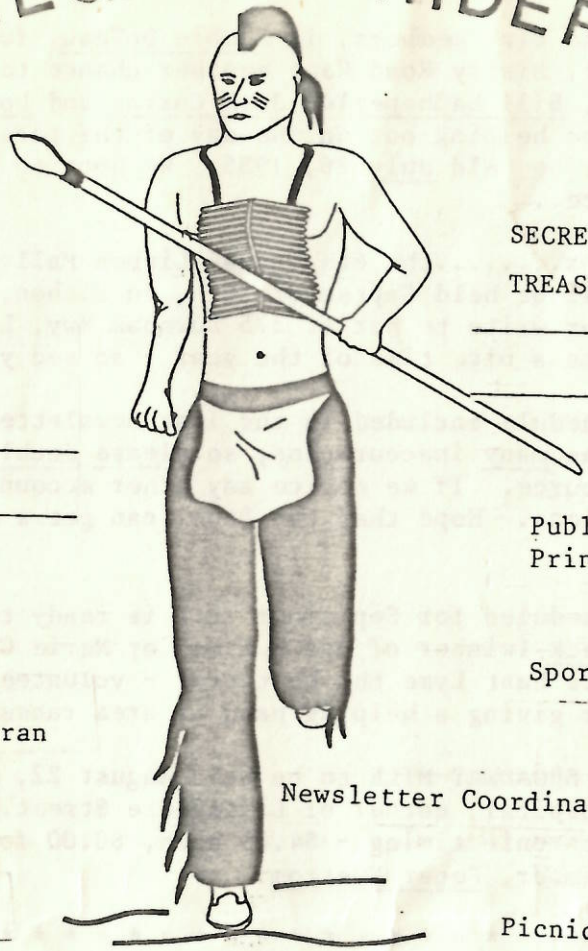

RACE RESULTS

Again, we are asking for someone to volunteer to report regularly on area races, or any other races that they may have a chance to get to. In the absence of a regular reporter, we ask that if you would like to have your race accomplishments listed in the Arrowhead, please contact Jack Curran, Debbie DeVeau, Joan Hill - or somebody! We don't know what you've been up to if you don't tell us. So the following race results may be spotty, but will hopefully let people know what their fellow club members have been up to!

The men's racing teams have been doing a fantastic job - but for the ladies? It's been a bit quiet from that direction. Well, ladies, August 10th we should get a chance to show our stuff in Willimantic. If you're interested in team racing, please give Jack Curran a call.

The Springtime Festival (Danielson) was the first warm race this season - despite the heat the winning time (for the 3.1 mile course) was 14:27 by Gary Nixon, Wayne Jacobs coming in 4th with a time of 14:54, and then in 9th, 12th, and 14th places consecutively were Billy Marshall, Bill Rogers, and Jim Uhrig. Also running Dennis Tetreault, Billy Shea, Jan Slonski, Gary Pizczek, Debbie DeVeau.

Newest member, Ron Cozean easily ran the Sub Base 5 miler, winning it with a time of 25:26. But Ron wasn't the only Strider to do well: places 2, 3, 4, and 5 were taken by Bill Rogers (26:28), Phil Garland (26:32), Bill Marshall (26:49), and Joe Banas (26:58). Also Striders Walt Smolenski, John Ficarra, Don Lewis, Julio Murillo, John Brown, Tom Lee, John Kelley and Way Hedding had something to celebrate at the after-the-race festivities. Debs DeVeau led the ladies in with a time of 32:38.

On the same day (May 26) Jim Uhrig put in an impressive 31:51 for the Woodstock 10K. Also running that day Dennis Tetreault (35:33) and Gari Depasse (35:39).



The Rose Arts Race was (not surprizingly) was won by two Strider members in the men's and ladies divisions. Ron Cozean was the first finisher in 55:06; Carla Brown took first in the women's division with a time of 65:01, placing 58th overall. Also running well that day: Bill Rogers (55:56), Bob Stack (56:43), Tim Smith (57:03), Joe Banas ((58:32), and Bill Marshall (59:25), taking places, 2, 5, 8, 14, and 17. A good hard race was put in by Jim Butler (27th), John Brown (35th) and Bob Harding (45th). The Norwich Bulletin did a good job of promotion of the race, and of covering the results. WICH and Al Morrison did an excellant job of keeping us informed of the runners positions as the race progressed. Congratulations to all the other Striders who put in a good hard race too!

The Father Casey 4.7 miler was an easy victory for Chris Hansen, winning by almost a minute over the second place finisher, with a time of 24:57. Tim Smith, Dennis Tetreault, Gari Depasse, Julio Murillo, Bob Harding and Gary Pizczek represented the Striders at this favorite early summer race.

June 12th, 6:30 pm the 1st Annual Al Morrison Run for Reliance House was a run-away win for Wayne Jacob, with Bill Rogers comming in 2nd in a time of 15:40. Placing 4th was Jim Uhrig (15:57), 7th, Tim Smith (16:13), 11th, John Brown (16:44), 13th, Dennis Tetreault (16:47), 16th, Don Sikorski (17:02) and 19th, Bob Stack in 17:23. A good showing for the Striders, again, Al Morrison at the finish line with a running commentary and names. A good response to the race's first year!

In Prospect CT, the Mohegan Striders captured the team title at the TAC five mile state Championship. Ron Cozean took the race in 24:56 (1st place), Taking places 4, 5, 6, 7, were Bill Rogers, Joe Banas, Bob Stack and Jim Uhrig, guaranteeing the team victory. Also placing well was Tim Smith in 10th position, Bill Marshall in 12th (setting a new master's record), and Phil Garland in 14th position. A good run guys!

Also on June 28th was the Lebanon Lions Run, a scenic 10K. A good showing was put in by Ron LaFleur, Rose Buckingham and Clifford DeVeau.

The Striders were also well represented at the Canterbury 10K on July 5th. Wayne Jacob ran away with first place, but second belonged to Joe Banas with a time of 33:57. Dennis Tetreault placed 5th, Walt Smolenski 6th, Gari Depasse 7th. Striders also running were: Way Hedding, Carla Brown (just jogging she says - tell me another one!), Debbie DeVeau, Pete Volkmar, Kathy Smolenski, Cliff DeVeau, Don Werling, Rita and Jim Perdix. As usual, they were generous with the prize money and merchandise prizes, as well as with the hot dogs and hamburgs and soda.

The Third Annual New London "Sail Festival" Run attracted quite a few Striders also. LEDYARD — Chris Hansen of Norwich, a St. Bernard High School graduate and senior at Holy Cross College, led from start to finish in winning the seventh annual Father Casey 4.7 miles race Sunday.

The run was staged in conjunction with the Our Lady of Lourdes Parish Festival.

Hansen was clocked in 24 minutes, 57 seconds, as he finished a nearly a full minute ahead of runnerup Dave Raunig, who was timed at 25:47.

Hansen was both Open and Overall winner.

Sharples receives national award

ORLANDO, Fla. — Doug Sharples of St. Bernard High School was named 1986 National High School Cross Country Coach of the Year here Friday night during the annual convention of the National High School Athletic Coaches Association.

"I'm tremendously excited," Sharples said of the honor. "I feel I am very young to win it. Most of the contenders have been at the game much longer than I have."

Sharples was one of eight regional nominees competing for the national honor. He represented Region One, which encompasses New England and New York state. He also won the regional honor in 1981.

Sharples has been boys' cross country coach at St. Bernard for 18 years, compiling an 283-54 overall record, including dual meets and invitationals. Sharples-coached teams won State Open championships in 1968, 1969 and 1981 as well as state class titles in 1968, 1981 and 1983.

His teams won 14 invitational championships as well as nine conference championships in the 13 years the team competed in conferences.

Striders take state title race

PROSPECT — Rose Arts Road Race winner Ron Cozean was the individual winner as the Mohegan Striders captured the team title at the TAC five-mile state championship race yesterday.

Cozean's time of 24:56 was a course record and nearly a minute ahead of second-place finisher Don Cavanaugh, the former record-holder. Cozean earned \$100 for breaking the 25-minute mark. Bob Hensley of the Milford Road Runners was third in 26:11.

The Striders' five-man team time of 2 hours, 12 minutes was 10 minutes ahead of the second-place Warren Street Athletic Club and 19 minutes in front of the Libra Athletic Association.

After Hensley came four straight Striders, Bill Rogers (26:41), Joe Banas (26:52), Bob Stack (27:04) and Jim Uhrig (27:12).

Tim Smith of the Striders was 10th in 27:24, Bill Marshall finished 12th and set a masters' record of 28:25 and Phil Garland was 14th in 27:49.

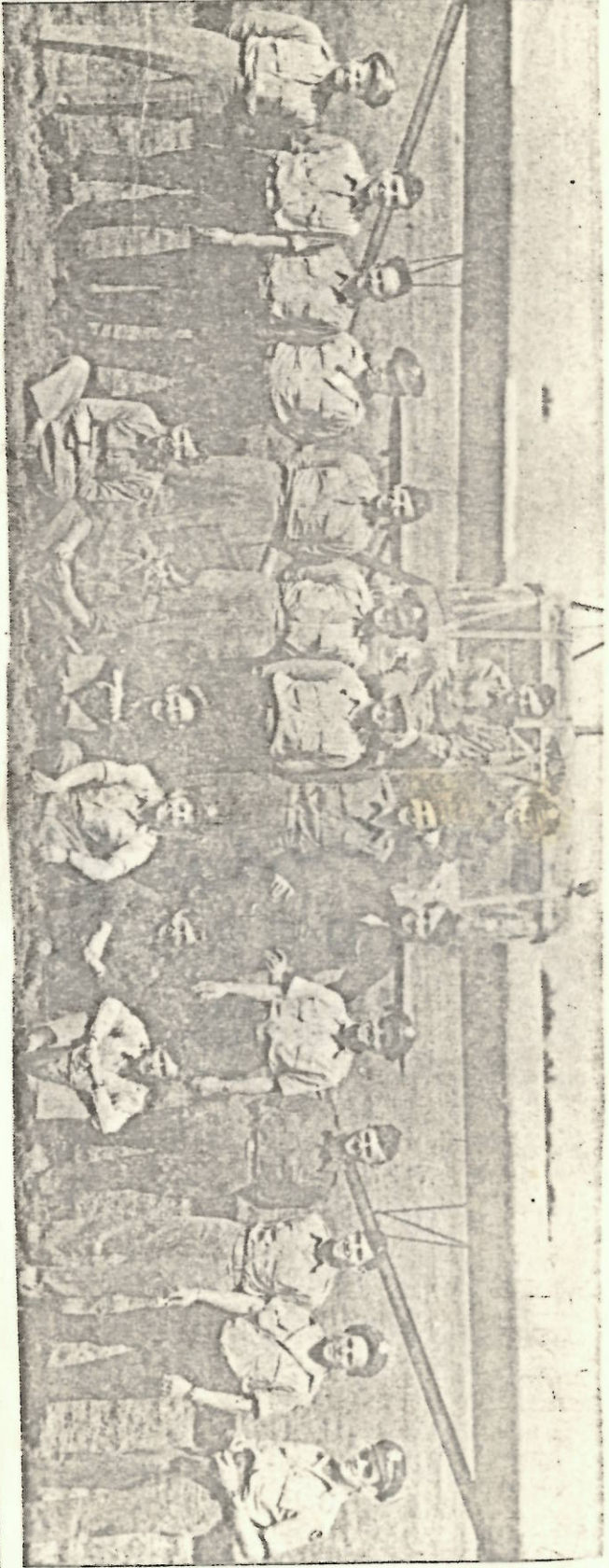

Ex-pilot soothed by memories of gliding

WATERFORD — James P. Rowan's favorite jogging path gives him a good view of Waterford Airport, but it's been 10 years since he's been at the controls of an airplane, and more than 40 since he piloted gliders into enemy-occupied Normandy, Holland, and Germany.

"I really loved that, flying," the 68-year-old Rowan said over a third cup of coffee at a restaurant near his Waterford home. "It's still there. I'd just love to get into an airplane and take off."

Today marks the 41st anniversary of the largest airborne exercise on over Germany. It involved 1,346 gliders, carrying 3,492 troops, artillery, and sup-

can and British ground troops.

That mission was Rowan's third, and last, but when he talks about flying gliders, even the large 15-place CG-4As, he still remembers everything.

"The only sound is the wind," he said. "There's no noise from a motor, nothing. It's beautiful, really it is."

"The dreams were always there," he continued, explaining why he's stayed away from airplanes all these years. "All I

and get my own airplane."

After the war, a 30-year career at Northeast Utilities and a burgeoning family made that dream impossible.

In 1976, when his children, Patricia, now 30, and Steven, now 34, were out of the house, Rowan decided to try again. He enrolled in flight training at Waterford Airport, and completed 10 hours of flying time. He also piloted a successful solo. But when he returned home after the solo, he

er have approved of his return to the flight line.

"It wasn't fair for me to get all this enjoyment and her to worry," he said ruefully.

The dream that began with an airplane ride on a sunny day in 1941 ended with the snap of his logbook cover in 1976.

In 1941, Rowan was a 22-year-old airplane mechanic, already a veteran of a year and a half in the Army Air Corps. One of the flight instructors at the airfield offered him a ride that day, and changed his life.

"One ride, it was just the one that did it," he said, his bright blue eyes lighting up behind thick, horn-rimmed glasses. "Oh man, I loved it."

"That was the most exciting I had ever had in my life."
